IGHTFIELD is a parish, village and township, 4 miles south-east from Whitchurch station, on the London and North Western and Great Western joint railway, 20 north from Shrewsbury and 7 north-west from Market Drayton, in the Northern division of the county, Whitchurch division of North Bradford hundred, Whitchurch petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Whitchurch, archdeaconry of Salop and diocese of Lichfield. The church of St. John the Baptist is an embattled edifice of red and white stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, north aisle or Kilmorey chapel, south porch and an embattled western tower, with pinnacles, containing a clock and 6 bells: the east window is stained: on the floor of the nave is a canopied brass with effigies and a marginal inscription to "Dame Margaret Calveley, daughter of William Maynwaryng, of Ightfield Hall, and afterwards wife of Philip Egerton esq." c. 1400; and another with mutilated effigy to the "Good" William Maynwaryng, a special benefactor to the church, ob. 1497; this was removed from the church during the restoration mentioned below, but will probably be replaced: the church contains an oak chest, c. 1500, and in the churchyard is an ancient stone cross, rising from four steps, panelled in quatre-

foil: the church was completely restored in 1865, at a cost of nearly £3,000, and will seat 200 persons. The register dates from the year 1557. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £141, net yearly value £257, including 21 acres of glebe land and £100 from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, with residence, in the gift of A. P. Heywood-Lonsdale esq. and held since 1892 by the Rev. Richard Butler Faulkner M.A. of Trinity Hall, Cambridge, rural dean of Whitchurch. There are Baptist and Primitive Methodist chapels. Arthur Pemberton Heywood-Lonsdale B.A., D.L., J.P. of Cloverley, is principal landowner and lord of the manor. The soil is loam and clay; subsoil, various. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and turnips. The area is 1,609 acres of land and 6 of water; rateable value, £2,493; the population in 1891 was 314.

IRONBRIDGE, including Madeley Wood, is a market town on a steep acclivity; many of the houses, standing upon lofty precipices, have a picturesque appearance; it is 6 miles south from Wellington, 6 south-west from Shifnal, 8 north-north-west from Bridgnorth and 13 from Shrewsbury and was formed into an ecclesiastical parish in 1845 from the parish of Madeley: it is in the Mid division of the county, in Madeley union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Wenlock, archdeaconry of Ludlow and diocese of Hereford: the name is derived from an iron bridge which crosses the Severn at this place; it was the first iron bridge of large dimensions constructed in this country and was cast and erected at Coalbrookdale in the years 1777-1779; the span of the arch is 100 feet, the width of bridge, exclusive of parapets, is 26 feet, the height from the base line to the centre 40 feet; total weight of iron, 378 tons: the Severn Valley railway has a station here. The town is lighted with gas from works at Madeley Wood, established in 1839 and the property of the Ironbridge Gas Light Co. Limited. The water supply is partly derived from wells in the neighbourhood and from a spring at Sutton hill, and is conveyed in iron mains to the town. The church of St. Luke, erected in 1836, is a structure of brick, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles and an embattled tower, with pinnacles, containing a clock and one bell: the west window is stained and there are 1,062 sittings, of which 912 are free. The register dates from the year 1834. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £84, net yearly value £170, inclusive of pew rents, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Madeley and held since 1867 by the Rev. George Wintour, of Worcester College, Oxford, and surrogate. The Wesleyan Methodist chapel, erected in the year 1837, is a structure of brick and will hold about 700 persons. The Ironbridge Dispensary, in High street, was established in 1828: no dispensing is done here now, however, but patients attend at the houses of the different surgeons; the average number of patients is about 1,000. In the town are several brick and tile works, malthouses and one or two limeworks. The Police Station, erected in 1862, at the junction of the Madeley and Coalport roads, is a substantial building of brick in the Italian style, consisting of magistrates' room, with retiring room attached, residence for police, three cells and prisoners' airing ground. The Madeley Union Workhouse, a structure of brick in the Gothic style, is here, and was erected in 1875 at a cost of £12,000. A drinking fountain, of red granite, was erected in 1862 in the Market square, at the expense of Mrs. Bartlett, of

Marnwood, in memory of her husband, the Rev. John Bartlett M.A. The market day is Friday and a fair is held annually on the 29th of May. The St. Milburga Lodge of Freemasons, numbering 30 members, hold their meetings at the Tontine hotel. The representatives of J. G. and W. Reynolds esqrs. who are lords of the manor, and William Orme Foster esq. J.P., D.L. of Apley Park, the Coalbrookdale Company, the Madeley Wood Company, Mrs. Whitmore and Miss Darby are the principal landowners. The soil is principally clay, with a limestone bottom. The chief crops are a limited quantity of wheat. The population in 1891 was 2,739, including 91 officers and inmates in Madeley Workhouse.

JACKFIELD, an ecclesiastical parish formed Feb. 7, 1862, is 1 mile north-east from the town of Broseley, 1 east-by-south from Ironbridge station and 1 north-west from Coalport, on the Severn Valley line, and on the bank of the river Severn, which separates it from Madeley. It is in the Mid division of the county, Much Wenlock petty sessional division, Madeley union and county court district, rural deanery of Wenlock, archdeaconry of Ludlow and diocese of Hereford. The old church of St. Mary, erected in 1759 by Francis Turner Blythe, is an edifice of red brick, consisting of chancel and nave and a western tower containing one bell, given by Mrs. Brown in 1760: the church being undermined is now no longer safe. The new church of St. Mary, erected in 1863, as a memorial to G. Pritchard esq. late high sheriff of Salop, at a cost of £3,000, is in the French Pointed style of colored bricks with stone dressings, and is cruciform, from designs by Sir A. W. Blomfield A.R.A., F.S.A.: it is seated on the side of the river between the railway and the Severn: the church has a north porch and a turret 75 feet high, containing one bell: there are 300 sittings. The register dates from the year 1759. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £145, with residence, styled St. Mary's rectory, in the alternate gift of the trustees of the Cruckton estate and the rector of Broseley, and held since 1893 by the Rev. John Marsden Edwards M.A., L.T. of Bishop Hatfield's Hall, Durham. The cholera burial ground, consecrated in 1862, adjoins the red church. The district is widely celebrated for its roofing tiles which have been made for centuries, and in more recent years have been sent to all parts of the kingdom, also to many places abroad; the seam of clay from which the tiles are made is found at a considerable depth below the surface, deeper even than some of the coal measures: the principal firms engaged in the manufacture of these tiles are: Messrs.

Limited, have built most complete and extensive works and employ numerous artists, designers and workpeople in these branches of artistic and decorative manufacture. The traffic of the place, with that of the lower Severn, was formerly carried on by barges, but the Severn Valley branch of the Great Western railway now passing through the place provides railway communication with all parts of the country. Lord Forester, of Willey Park, William Orme Foster esq. J.P., D.L. of Apley Park, and the trustees of the Cruckton estate, Shrewsbury, are the principal landowners. The soil is principally loamy, gravelly and clayey; subsoil, clay and sandstone. The area is 500 acres; the population in 1891 was 1,041.
