HOOE.

Population, 470 ; post-town, Battle, from which it is six miles south-west, ten west from Hastings and eleven east-north-east from Eastbourne, and ten south-east from Hailsham ; in the county-court district and rural deanery of Hastings, union of Hailsham, archdeaconry of Lewes and Diocese of Chichester.

The Church of St. Oswald is an ancient stone building in the perpendicular style, and consists of chancel, nave, small chapel on the north side and a low but massive embattled tower with five bells. There is a stained glass window with figures representing Edward III. and Phillipa, similar to that said to have been stolen from Bexhill. The register dates from 1531.

The living is a vicarage, in the gift of Alfred Jones, Esq., and held by the Rev. Naasson Maning, B.A., of Trinity College, Dublin.

The five bells are thus inscribed ;—

- 1st.—I mean to make it understood
That tho' I'm little, yet I'm good.
2nd.—To honor both of God and King,
Our voices shall in concert ring.
3rd.—Long live the King, George 3rd restored.
4th.—Peace and good neighbourhood.
Not to repeat what's gone and past,
For the five bells are come at last.
5th.—John Norton and John Blackman,
Ch. Wardens.

In addition to the inscriptions here given, each bell bears "W. J. Mears, late Lester Pack & Chapman, of London, fecit 1789."

The Manor of Hooe was among the possessions of the Earl of Eu, and was given by him to the Abbey of Bec, in Normandy, early in the twelfth century, and, shortly afterwards, a priory of Benedictine monks was established here, attached to that Abbey; both monks and priory have, however, long since passed away.

The area of the parish is 2473 acres; the rateable value, £3,373.
